- 3. Titles that combine sound instruction with warm, spiritual insight.
- 4. Titles that tend to correct Christian misunderstandings.
- 5. Titles that will nurture your appetite for substantive Christian literature.
- 6. Titles in print.

Suggestions:

- 1. Add your reading of these to your regular devotional time.
- 2. Read even 10-15 minutes a day, five days a week.
- 3. Overview a book and its chapters before beginning.
- 4. Use a series of colored highlighters to outline harder books.
- 5. Store some of the good thoughts in the margin of your Bible.
- 6. Don't fret over not finishing a title.
- 7. Move on to the next new title every couple of months, or. . .
- 8. ... read more than one title at a time.
- 9. Talk to someone about your reading. Share it!
- 10. Buy a book for someone else.
