





"Aunting", like parenting and grandparenting, is one of God's ways to influence the next generation. Unlike parenting, Aunting may be only part-time, but that does not stop it from being full-time fun. Here are some suggestions for Aunting through different stages of life.

### Aunting long distance:

"Top of the list, of course, is visiting my nieces and nephews and a close second is praying for them. Visiting made me much more aware of their spiritual needs. . . I send a gift when they're born. Sometimes it's been a cute outfit, but I've looked for more spiritually-oriented things. For my younger nieces and nephews, having a strong relationship with their parents seems rather important at this stage. Then the trickle-down effect kicks in with my brothers and sisters-in-law telling their kids 'Aunt Sarah sent this,' 'Aunt Sarah is coming for a visit,' etc."

# Aunting locally:

### For young nieces and nephews:

- Keep a toy box. This can be stocked inexpensively with toys found at garage sales, consignment shops, Goodwill, etc. Durable, empty containers (such as an Altoids box or hot chocolate tin) make fun toys. A friend told me she put an old remote control in her toy box and found her young niece putting it up to her ear like a cell phone!
- Collect children's books. Good books can be procured cheaply.
- Keep a few kid games handy (like Candyland or Go Fish).
- Take pictures. Young nieces & nephews will enjoy seeing themselves.
- Keep tape, scrap paper, stickers, etc. on hand.

#### Fun (and low cost) activities:

- Make cookies / bake together
- Make valentines or Christmas cards together (this is where the tape, paper and stickers come in handy)
- Make Christmas ornaments
- Go to the park
- Work in the yard/plant things together
- Tell stories
- Read books
- Make a fort (see picture on next page)
- Pick blueberries or strawberries



### For the truly ambitious. . .

- Have a slumber party! Invite mom, dad and kids over for supper. By the time the parents go home, it is nearly time for the kids to go to bed. The kids get ready for bed and then you read books and tell stories to get them settled down. Have an activity planned for the next morning. After lunch, it is time to take the children back to their home.
- Plan activities with short time frames in mind –
  fifteen minutes to an hour. Short sprints help
  keep younger children from getting bored as well
  as leaving each activity on the best possible
  note. You must be alert and anticipate when a
  change of activity is needed in order to stay
  ahead of little ones.
